A Christian Reflection on New Year's Day: By: Dennis Wright

As another year comes to a close, many of us pause to reflect on what has passed and look forward with hope to what lies ahead. New Year's Day has become a time for resolutions, celebrations, and fresh beginnings, but its history—and its meaning for Christians—runs deeper than fireworks and calendars.

The Historical Roots of New Year's Day

The celebration of the New Year stretches back thousands of years. Ancient Babylon marked the new year with spring festivals tied to planting and harvest cycles. Later, the Roman calendar originally began in March, but in 46 B. C. Julius Caesar reformed it, establishing January 1 as the start of the year. January was named after *Janus*, the Roman god of doorways and beginnings, often depicted with two faces—one looking back and one looking forward.

Over time, this civil tradition was adopted across much of the world. The Church, however, placed its own spiritual emphasis on the turning of the year. In medieval Europe, Christians often associated New Year's with the Feast of the Circumcision of Christ (celebrated on January 1, eight days after Christmas, according to Jewish custom). This reminded believers that the day was not about superstition or human traditions alone but about God's covenant and the coming of the Savior.

New Beginnings in Christ

For Christians, the changing of the calendar is less about worldly rituals and more about spiritual renewal. Scripture reminds us that God is the true author of time.

- *"So teach us to number our days, that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom"* (Psalm 90:12)
- *"Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come"* (2 Corinthians 5:17)

As we step into a new year, we are invited to look back with gratitude for God's faithfulness and forward with trust in His promises. Unlike the Roman god Janus, who could only look two ways, our faith teaches us to look upward—to Christ, the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the end (Revelation 22:13).

A Time for Reflection and Commitment

Making resolutions at the New Year can be valuable, but Christians are called to more than self-improvement. We are called to surrender to God's transforming work in our lives. Instead of resolutions driven by willpower, we are reminded of commitments grounded in grace:

To grow in prayer and Scripture reading.

- To strengthen fellowship within the body of Christ.
- To serve others with the love of Christ.
- To seek holiness and set aside the sins of the past year.

Moving into the New Year with Hope

As we celebrate New Year's Day, let us not be swept away by the world's focus on parties and resolutions alone. Instead, let us remember the faithfulness of God in the year behind us and step into the year ahead with the assurance that He goes before us. May our prayer be like that of the psalmist:

"You crown the year with Your goodness, and Your paths drip with abundance" (Psalm 65:11)

The world celebrates New Year's Day as a fresh start, but Christians know that every day is a gift from the Lord. Let us use this season not just to look back and forward but to look upward, dedicating our days to Him who makes all things new.

Remembering Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. By: Dennis Wright
A Christian Reflection of Faith, Justice, and Love

Each January, our nation pauses to remember the life and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. While many know him as a civil rights leader, Dr. King was first and foremost a Christian minister whose vision for justice flowed from his faith in Jesus Christ. Martin Luther King Jr Day is not only a national holiday but also a moment for the Church to reflect on what it means to live out the gospel in a broken and divided world.

The Christian Roots of Dr. King's Vision

Dr. King was deeply influenced by the words of Scripture. He believed that the struggle for equality and justice was not merely a political cause but a spiritual calling. Echoing the prophets of the Old Testament, He declared with Amos: *"Let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like a mighty stream"* (Amos 5:24).

He reminded America that God created all people in His image (Genesis 1:27) and that in Christ there is no division of race, class, or background: *"There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is no male or female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus"* (Galatians 3:28)

For Dr. King, the fight against segregation and racism was inseparable from his call to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ.

The Power of Nonviolence

Dr. King championed nonviolent resistance, believing that love was stronger than hate. His conviction was rooted in Jesus' Sermon on the Mount:

"But I say to you, Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you" (Matthew 5:44)

In a time of hatred and hostility, Dr. King taught that the Christian response was not revenge but redemptive love. His dream was not simply for social change, but for hearts to be transformed by God's truth and love.

Why It Matters Today

More than 50 years after Dr. King's life was cut short, the Church still bears responsibility to be a light in the world. Martin Luther King Jr. Day is not only a reminder of what was accomplished but also a call to continue the work of reconciliation.

As Christians, we are called to:

- * Stand for justice where there is no oppression.
- Build bridges where there is division.
- Live out Christ's command to love our neighbor as ourselves (Mark 12:31).

A Day to Reflect, Remember, and Act

As we remember Dr. King, let us not only celebrate a historic figure but also recommit ourselves to the mission of Christ. The holiday is an invitation to examine our hearts, to repent of prejudice or indifference, and to seek the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace (Ephesians 4:3)

Dr. King once said, *"Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate, only love can do that."* As followers of Christ-the true Light of the world-we are called to shine in dark places with love, courage, and hope.

- Thank Him for the times you didn’t fall because H intervened before you even knew you were in danger.

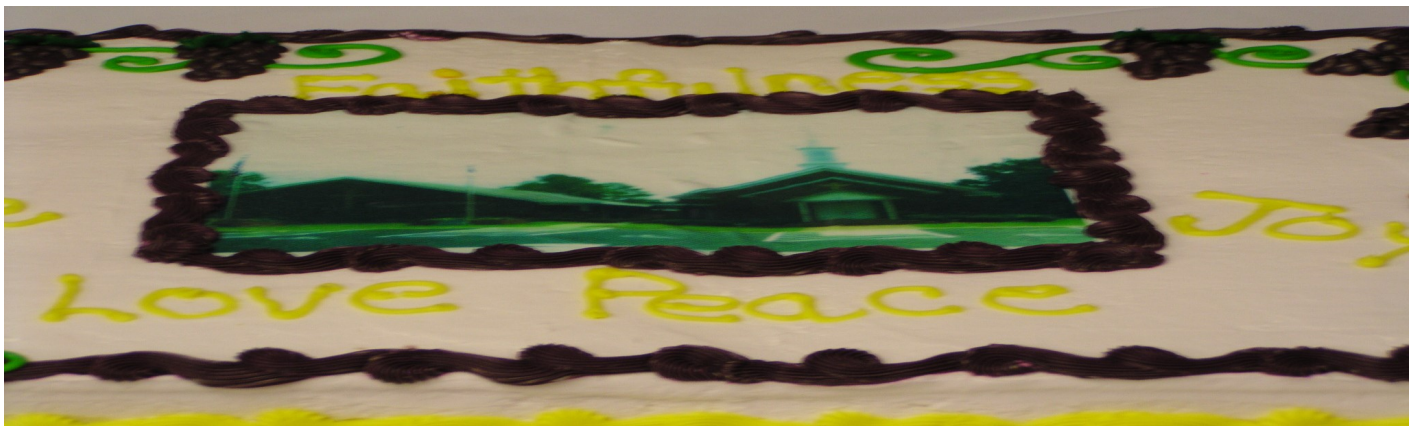
The Psalmist reminds us:
